# The Leader You Were Made to Be

Discovering Your God-Designed Identity in Leadership

“Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I set you apart; I appointed you as a prophet to the nations.”

**Jeremiah 1:5 (NIV)**

## INTRODUCTION

Every leader has a moment of reckoning — a quiet, soul-searching pause where a crucial question echoes within: Am I leading from my own strength, or am I leading from the identity God gave me? The world will offer you titles, strategies, and personality assessments to define your leadership. But Scripture offers something far greater: the revelation that your leadership was not invented by you, it was intentionally designed by God before time began.

From the moment God breathed life into you (Genesis 2:7), He embedded within you gifts, callings, and capacities that are uniquely yours. The Apostle Paul reminds us in Ephesians 2:10 that we are “God’s handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.” You are not an accident. You are not an afterthought. You are a masterpiece with a mandate.

This week’s devotional invites you to lay aside the pressure to perform or prove your leadership and instead press into the profound truth: the leader you were made to be is already within you, waiting to be fully awakened by the Spirit of God.

## SCRIPTURE FOUNDATION

Let's look at several key passages that illuminate God's intentional design in crafting you as a leader:

“For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well.”

**Psalm 139:13–14 (NIV)**

David's awe in this passage is not merely poetic — it is theological. To be “fearfully and wonderfully made” means that the God of the universe was intentional and meticulous in your design. Every strength, every sensitivity, every gift you carry in leadership was not random. It was woven into you with purpose.

“We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us. If your gift is prophesying, then prophesy in accordance with your faith; if it is serving, then serve; if it is teaching, then teach; if it is to encourage, then give encouragement; if it is giving, then give generously; if it is to lead, do it diligently; if it is to show mercy, do it cheerfully.”

**Romans 12:6–8 (NIV)**

God has distributed leadership gifts diversely and deliberately across His people. There is no singular mold for the biblical leader. Some lead through vision, others through service, others through teaching. The question is not “How do I become a leader?” but rather, “How do I faithfully steward the leader I already am?”

“Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms.”

**1 Peter 4:10 (NIV)**

Biblical leadership is not self-serving — it is stewardship. You are a steward of the gifts, influence, and calling God has entrusted to you. As Inspiring Biblical Leadership teaches, true leaders harness the power of God's Word to lead with vision, purpose, wisdom, and integrity — not to build personal empires, but to transform lives.

## DEVOTIONAL REFLECTION

Moses tried to talk God out of his calling. He said, “I am slow of speech and tongue” (Exodus 4:10). Gideon declared, “My clan is the weakest in Manasseh, and I am the least in my family” (Judges 6:15). Jeremiah protested, “I do not know how to speak; I am too young” (Jeremiah 1:6). Yet God called them anyway. God did not choose them because of their credentials — He equipped them because of His calling.

This is one of the most liberating truths in Scripture: God’s calling is not dependent on your current capability. It is dependent on His sovereign design. The leader you were made to be is not the polished, perfected version of yourself you’re still working toward — it is the Spirit-empowered, Scripture-grounded, servant-hearted person you are becoming every day you yield to God.

At Inspiring Biblical Leadership, we believe that every person — whether in ministry, business, or community — carries a God-given leadership capacity. The journey of leadership is not about acquiring a title. It is about discovering your design, deepening your character, and deploying your gifts with humility and courage.

Perhaps today you feel inadequate. Perhaps comparison has caused you to question whether you truly belong in your leadership role. Take heart. God didn’t make a mistake when He placed you where you are. He is not scrambling for a backup plan. He is patiently and purposefully cultivating the leader He always envisioned you to be.

## REFLECTIVE QUESTIONS

Take your time with each question. These are not designed for quick answers — they are designed to draw you deeper into honest conversation with God and yourself.

When you think about your leadership role, do you lead more from your God-given identity or from the expectations of others? What does that look like in your daily decisions?

What specific gifts, strengths, or experiences has God placed in you that uniquely equip you to lead in this season? Have you fully embraced and activated them?

In what areas of your leadership have you been tempted to compare yourself to others or to minimize your calling? How does God's Word speak to that comparison?

4

Moses, Gideon, and Jeremiah all initially resisted their calling. Is there an area of leadership God is calling you into that you have been resisting? What is holding you back?

How would your leadership look different if you fully believed that God formed you, gifted you, and appointed you for this very moment in time?

## PRACTICAL APPLICATION

Faith without works is dead (James 2:17). Great devotionals produce great action. Here are five practical steps to begin walking in the fullness of the leader God made you to be:

1

### Conduct a Gift Inventory

This week, take 30 minutes to prayerfully list the gifts, strengths, and experiences God has given you. Use Romans 12:6–8 as your framework. Ask a trusted mentor or colleague to affirm what they observe in your leadership. Often, others see the leader in us before we see it ourselves.

### Renew Your Leadership Identity Daily

Begin each morning with a 5-minute declaration over your life as a leader. Speak Jeremiah 1:5, Psalm 139:14, and Ephesians 2:10 aloud. Declarations rooted in Scripture are not wishful thinking — they are faith in action, aligning your mind with God's truth about who you are.

### Identify One Area of Resistance

Is there a leadership opportunity, conversation, or assignment you have been avoiding? Write it down. Pray specifically over it this week and ask God to show you how your unique design equips you to step into it with confidence.

### Serve in Your Strength Zone

Identify one opportunity this week to lead in an area directly aligned with your God-given gifts. Whether it is encouraging your team, casting vision in a meeting, or mentoring someone younger, exercise your God-given leadership gifts intentionally.

### Connect with a Leadership Community

No leader grows in isolation. Visit InspiringBiblicalLeadership.org to explore articles, Bible verses, and resources designed to equip you. Consider sharing this devotional with another leader who needs to be reminded of who God made them to be.

May every person I lead encounter the grace and excellence of the leader You called me to be. In Jesus’ name, Amen.
